- well-behaved at all times.




I am certain that all parents will agree with me, these rules are simple and fair and should be expected of all children without compromise.

## ECO SCHOOLS

AGS are proud to announce we have launched a whole new Eco-schools committee. The Eco-Schools committee provides pupils of Ash Green the platform to demonstrate and apply skills during small projects designed by our own pupils with the ambition of making Ash Green a more biodiverse and ecological friendly site. Pupils are encouraged and directed to formulate projects which reduce waste, increase recycling, conduct land surveys, and increase areas of natural beauty within our school site. Our aim is to decrease the carbon footprint of our school and increase opportunities for pupils to become empowered to affect positive change within our school site.

Current projects include:

- Gaining area of conservation to aid mental health and increase biodiversity at AGS.
- To decrease the carbon footprint of our current school menu.
- Reduce litter by forming long and short-term strategies for recycling and waste reduction.
- Gaining voice within the current student council.
- Linking our projects to the current curriculum so teaching and learning can support our objectives whole school.

Overall, we as a committee wish to make the school a better place.

The Eco-School project launched our first big project in line with "keep Britain tidy" by participating in the big litter clean up project. Pupils pledged to clean up the school site by collecting five large bin liners of litter. Over two days pupils gathered eleven large bin liners full of small litter which illustrates our ability as a group to exceed our initial commitments in projects we undertake.





# YEAR 12 AUSCHWITZ

On the 14th of March, Miss Duffy travelled with year 12 students Neve and Bradley on a one-day trip to Auschwitz Birkenau with the Holocaust Education Trust on the lessons from Auschwitz project. Despite having to be at school for 4am, and not getting back until 11pm, it was a very interesting and engaging day.



After landing in Krakow airport, we drove to Oswiecim, the town renamed Auschwitz during the German occupation of Poland, where we discussed Pre-war Jewish life and visited the sight of the Grand Synagogue (which was taken down by Nazi order). This showed us how even in a town with such good integration of Jewish and Christian culture and communities, antisemitism and hatred can spread and have devastating effects.

We then went to Auschwitz 1. This site was a Polish army barracks before it was taken over by the Nazis, to be used as a concentration and later extermination camp. Now, it is the Polish state museum for the Holocaust. Here we saw: The Book of Names - which holds the names of 4.8 million of the 6 million Jews killed in the Holocaust; the hair, shoes and other personal possessions of those killed in Auschwitz; various sights of executions (hangings and shootings); the uniforms of prisoners and photos of those incarcerated in Auschwitz; and

we walked through the gas chamber and crematorium. This was an extremely emotional experience as it helped to put into perspective both the massive amount of people who were

murdered in the Holocaust, but also, the finer details, reminding us that every victim was a unique individual who had their liberty – and often life – taken from them simply for living their lives.

Our final stop of the day was Auschwitz-Birkenau. Walking along the train track towards the infamous silhouette of the camp was very sobering. Despite much of the camp having been destroyed by the Nazis, in an attempt to cover their activities, there was still lots for us to see and discuss. The latrine block and a






barrack first, to help us understand the squalor and hardship the prisoners lived in, before walking along the selection platform and up the path to the sight of the crematorium. Here we heard poignant testimony of prisoners trying to honour those who died and in doing so, risked their own lives. The final part of our tour was The Sauna, the area where medical assessments took place, prisoners were tattooed, and forced to walk through hot steam to ensure their skin was sterilised. Here we saw some of the items confiscated from prisoners, this included an entire wall of photos. These depicted the friends and family of the prisoners, many of the people in the images were also killed in the Holocaust.

To conclude the day, we had a memorial service with Rabbi Epstein. We heard testimony and poems; a psalm; and a prayer sang in Hebrew. It was hauntingly beautiful. Listening to the Rabbi sing in a language that was central to the culture that the Nazis were trying to obliterate. This gave us time to reflect on everything we had seen that day: on all the lives, stories and culture that was lost, and how, despite all the persecution, the Jewish people continue to thrive.

Despite it being a very long and emotionally draining day, the experience we had and the sights we saw helped us to gain a deeper understanding of one of the darkest periods of human history and has allowed us to re-personalise the Holocaust and carry on the stories of those who died at



the hands of a hateful and narrow-minded regime.

In March, students engaged in National Careers week. NCW is a dedicated week every year allowing schools, colleges, universities, alternative provision settings and organisations to focus on a celebration of careers guidance.

For this, we held assemblies with students and completed tutor time activities that concentrated on the importance of careers education in addition to our usual weekly job of the week focus for students.

We held two special events for this week.

Year 10 students attended What Career Live, a showcase event at the NEC in Birmingham where students had opportunities to meet with employers, apprenticeship providers and Higher Education Institutions to discover more about opportunities beyond their secondary education.















On Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> March, we hosted our very first Aspirations Day.

This was an opportunity for students from all year groups from year 7 to 13 to meet with employers, apprenticeship providers, Further Education Providers and Higher Education Institutions hosted at AGS. Providers included Wilmott Dixon, Warwickshire Fire Service, The RAF, Coventry City Council, Coventry College, NWSL College, The University of Leicester, Oxford Brookes University as well as a team from our Sixth form. Alongside this, we ran a competition for students to win a £15 Amazon voucher and the book, The Art of Being a Brilliant Teenager, for all students who completed a series of tasks throughout the event. We were delighted to award this prize to Jess in year 9 for her superb effort in engaging with the programme on the day.



## **INCLUSION HUB**

In the inclusion hub we run a break and lunchtime club daily. This provides a quiet safe space where students are encouraged to join in with activities such as board games, colouring and reading. This aims to support social skills and building of friendships and supports building confidence.

In March, we ran our second STEM event this half term where 15 students from year 7-9 took part in an activity ran by Smallpiece where they worked together to build elastic band cars. Students


worked well together using teamwork and problem-solving skills.

We have carried out student voice with a group of students identified as young carers to get their views on what activities they'd like to see in our young carers group that will run after the Easter Holidays.

We have trained some of our post-16 students this half term so that they can begin delivering a peer education project so KS3 next term. The Peer Education Project is a secondary schoolbased educational programme that aims to give young people the skills and knowledge they need to safeguard their mental health and that of their peers. The post- 16 students will be trained as peer educators who will ten deliver sessions to the peer learners.

Sessions include the following:

- We all have mental health, like physical health, and move along a spectrum.
- The risk and protective factors to our mental health, including dispelling common myths around mental health.
- The ways to look after our mental health and wellbeing, and where to seek help when needed.
- The ways we can support our peers.

A big thank you To Ms Autorino, Miss Howe and Mr Gardiner for planning and taking the pupils for a day out in which they all thoroughly enjoyed.




### FACULTY FOCUS: ENGLISH


Our KS3 cohort have been emersed in different Shakespearean worlds in The Tempest, Romeo and Juliet and Twelfth Night.

Year 10 have been studying their second GCSE set text, Macbeth and have been focusing on character development, language choices and key dramatic techniques.

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In addition to this, they have been introduced to Language Paper 2, which asks students to analyse two pieces of non-



fiction texts, then write an extended piece of writing assessing their ability to write for a specific purpose and audience.

Our Year 11 cohort have been busily preparing for their mock exams, studying key poems and revising Language Paper 2, which asks students to analyse two pieces of non-fiction texts, then write an extended piece of writing assessing their ability to write for a specific purpose and audience.

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As part of our World Book Day celebrations popular author Bali Rai came to visit us at Ash Green. After delivering an assembly to year 9 on the importance of reading as a life skill, he took two workshops. Some of the students who took part had already been reading 'Dream On' by Bali Rai as part of their English work and so had lots of questions about being an author and where he drew his inspiration from. We look forward to working with Bali again in the future to

support our aspiring writers.



World Poetry Day took place this March and we wanted to mark this event with the whole school. As years 7 and 8 will be studying poetry after Easter this seemed like the ideal opportunity to bring in Adisa, performance poet and wordsmith, to get our students thinking about poetry in a new

and exciting way. Adisa

delivered assemblies to years 7 and 8 and followed up with a workshop for students interested in the genre of poetry. The lively assemblies allowed Ash Green to see poetry as a creative and fun process that everyone can have a part in. It was amazing to see the flow of ideas from our young people as they demonstrated our Ash Green Values of aspiration and creativity!







### FACULY FOCUS: ENGLISH



Being able to enhance students' experiences with enrichment beyond the classroom enables deeper learning.

On Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March, we enjoyed a lovely theatre visit to the Belgrade Theatre in Coventry with a group of 40 year 11 students for an evening performance of 'An Inspector Calls'.

So close to their final exams and with 'An Inspector Calls' one of the core texts for GCSE English Literature, this was a fantastic opportunity for students. Students engaged in discussion with each other and staff after the performance about the portrayal of the characters on stage as well as the significance of key moments.

We thank Mr O'Malley for organising this trip for our students in English.

We always say in English that reading is not just for English lessons. It was great to see on World Book Day, the whole school getting involved in World Book Day activities. Especially popular was the 'Guess the shelfie competition'. Well done to SF2 who won the competition to guess who each of the book shelves from staff at school belonged to.





### **SPORTS REPORT**

As always, the focus and ethos in the PE Department is on giving students at AGS a range of opportunities to get involved in in a number of extra-curricular activities.

Alongside our core PE programme of study this term, we offered a badminton club, a football club, a dance club, a netball club and a table tennis club, with activities able to be accessed both at lunchtimes and after school.

The numbers that attended these clubs showed that there is a passion for sport and for trying new areas amongst our student body. Every club was well attended with numbers often exceeding 20 at clubs.

In the short 2<sup>nd</sup> half of the term, the focus was not only now on clubs, but also on sporting fixtures. We ran teams in both boys and girl's football, netball



and indoor athletics. Unfortunately, several fixtures were postponed due to poor weather and the industrial action.

Of those fixtures that did take place, notable results were:-




